An Update on the New Truck



The truck that best suits our requirements is manufactured in South Africa. It was delayed initially owing to a world-wide shortage of parts, and then again due to heavy rains which flooded the factory. It is now scheduled to arrive in this country in January 2023 but will need some adaptations before we can take delivery. We will keep you informed of progress.

Essential Tree Work



As we explained in our September newsletter, we are now seeing cases of ash dieback on the Commons. This is a fungal infection which is decimating ash trees around the country and started to appear on the Commons over the last year or so. Trees showing significant infection need to be felled, and you may have noticed specialist tree surgeons working on Centre Common Road recently. They also cleared foliage that was obscuring streetlamps.



A large Beech tree in Gunn Glade on St. Paul's Cray Common was recently found to be in a poor condition and had to be felled. Although we try to do as much work as possible in-house, this was a large tree and required specialist attention. We were able to arrange for the work to be done within a week of identifying the problem.



The 180 acres are protected and managed under an Act of Parliament.

However, the Act made no provision for funding, and we rely on the generosity of the local community to maintain the 180 acres of natural countryside within our urban setting.

We have two full-time Keepers, whose knowledge and dedication are invaluable. Everyone else who works to preserve and maintain the area does so voluntarily.
